Inside of the No.5 tomb The coins and lacquerwares were used to decorate the inside and outside of the coffin.

The coffins which were in the burial tombs seem to display the crouched in the tomb in an example position. The size is at most $1m \times 70$ cm. According to the teeth, head and skull, people who were in most of these tombs were positioned to face the north. There were also coins from China, lacquerwares, beads from rosaries, ink stones, and parts of armor, etc. We believe these are tombs of people who believed in Buddhism.No.5, No.129 and No.130 might be for children because these were smaller than the others. We found coins outside of No.5 and No.129. This means that people threw coins while filling the coffins.
